Our Society's coach trip to Chatham Dockyard

In the latest of the Society's coach trips, on Sunday 22nd September, forty-four members and friends enjoyed a trip to Chatham Historic Dockyard. This date was chosen as it was the weekend of the Dockyard's "Salute to the 40s" festival so, as well as the usual Dockyard attractions, a huge number of events were taking place.

As usual, our coach company was Carol Peters and, despite the coach being slightly late at the pick-up points, arrived Chatham at 11am. We had been sent wristband admission tickets in advance to hand out on the coach, so were able to go straight into the Dockyard and enjoy our first sight of all the many attractions or, in most cases, a welcome coffee break.

Many of us were already familiar with the Dockyard's exhibits, including the vessels HMS *Gannet* (1878), HMS *Cavalier* (1943), which is the National Destroyer Memorial, and the Oberon-class submarine HMS *Ocelot* (1964), as well as the famous Ropery. This amazing building, which dates from 1728, was when built the longest brick-built building in Europe at 1,135 feet long and incredibly is still used commercially to make rope.

As well as these and the other Dockyard exhibits, we saw and heard singers and musicians with 1940s music; displays of cars and commercial vehicles of the time; the Dockyard train running slowly up and down; a fun fair; and lots of food stalls, including the NAAFI. Perhaps most interesting were the several re-enactments of WWII shops

and buildings, including the National Fire Service firestation which was incredibly detailed and a whole street including a greengrocer and Post Office, all beautifully detailed with lots of interesting exhibits on display. Added to this were many people dressed in 1940s costumes, ranging from Royal Navy admirals to US Navy seamen and from very dressy ladies to 'spivs' carrying suitcases full of illicit goods for sale.

The weather was not quite as kind as it could have been although luckily the rain which was forecast held off except for one short shower. Otherwise occasional sunshine with a cool breeze, nothing bad enough to spoil the enjoyment.

Chatham Historic Dockyard is the home of the RNLI Heritage Museum and of particular interest to our group was the lifeboat *North Foreland*, which is exhibited in a prime location. This lifeboat was stationed at Margate from 1951 until 1978. Following the destruction of the jetty in the storm of the night of 11th/12th January 1978, the lifeboat house was cut off from the shore and a crew had to be landed on the jetty by helicopter, to launch the lifeboat and take it round to Ramsgate. A photograph of this event can be seen in the Summer 2012 edition of our Newsletter. One of our party, who was a police officer on

the police launch at the time, helped to man the lifeboat on this occasion and recalls the element of danger and the thrill of being launched down the slipway of the badly damaged jetty.

We now look forward to our next coach trip. Traditionally, these take place towards the end of May, when there is at least a chance of good weather, and to a Continental destination. We have a few possibilities in mind and your Committee will be deciding soon, so watch out for an announcement. Eliot mural was finally 'unveiled' by Margate Mayor, Cllr Mick Tomlinson, cutting the ribbon in front of the mural. Arnold with his wife, Isolde, had flown over from Hollywood for the occasion and Tracey Emin was amongst those who attended the ceremony along with a number of other members of Margate Civic Society..

During the ceremony, Arnold said:

"Margate holds a special place in my heart and I'm very pleased to be back here again, and able to donate my artwork to a town that has provided me with such a fruitful career.

Thank you to the Margate team at Southeastern for supporting my project. It's an honour to have been given the opportunity to create something special for passengers to enjoy while using the railway."

After the short ceremony, everyone was invited back to The Margate School (in the old Woolworth's Building in the High Street) for refreshments.

Arnold Schwartzman OBE, RDI is a stalwart member of our Society and served as Patron of the Society's Time-Ball Restoration Appeal in 2014. He is also Patron of The Margate School. Born in 1936, he has written numerous books on design generally and in particular on architectural design. Indeed, he is currently putting the finishing touches to his latest book on Arts & Crafts buildings.

Westbrook's Sunken Garden

This local gem was laid out in the 1930s and remains a hidden oasis of calm along the Royal Esplanade. Much loved by children and adults alike, it provides a green alternative to the beach and a shelter for when the winds sweep across the bay. Laid out with lush bedding, limestone rock walls and sunken grass pools, it is a unique feature in the landscape.

In 1930, the Government urged local authorities to find work for the unemployed. Later that same year, the Government reversed their policy which caused problems for Margate Borough Council for it had made plans for various works to be carried out. Because local authorities had to seek approval to the borrowing of monies (known as loan sanction) to finance their capital projects, the Mayor made a personal visit to the Ministry of Health accompanied by the Deputy Town Clerk, Mr A. E. Orchin, in an endeavour to obtain loan sanctions for each of the various capital works that were planned by Margate Borough Council to proceed. Their visit proved successful.

The Garden was built in 1931 and completed the following year. It is believed that Margate Borough Council's Parks Superintendent at the time, Sidney Legg, was responsible for the original design of the Garden. The Sunken Garden was a product of the Great Depression with the idea coming from the Mayor, Cllr Percy Bosworth Osborne (known as Margate's 'Optimistic Mayor'). The town needed to obtain sufficient earth (20,000 cubic yards) to construct the approaches to a new railway bridge at Westbrook. Local excavation would provide a sunken garden for nothing and create work for the unemployed.

The following extract from the *Thanet Advertiser and Echo* dated 13th November 1931 tells the story of how the Sunken Garden came into being:

Mayor's Bright Idea

Feeling, however, that it was necessary that all the Council's schemes of work, which had involved months of preparation, should not be rejected, the Mayor, in company with Mr. Orchin, made a personal visit to the Ministry and made out so strong a case that the Council had not only had the offer of a small grant for the car park scheme, but sanction for loan in addition.

Continuing, Councillor Abbott said it was on his journey to Whitehall that the Mayor passed the new bridge at Westbrook, then in the course of construction, and, realising the diffi-culties of the Borough Surveyor in finding filling to construct the approaches to the bridge, brought the matter to the notice of the Council. The birth of a thought led the Mayor to suggest a sunken garden at Westbrook, whereby sufficient earth could be obtained to make the roads to the bridge. It was entirely due to the Mayor that this project was introduced and materialised. A happy thought it proved to be, for the cost of the bridge alone was estimated at £16,170, but the complete undertaking, the bridge and the sunken garden, involved an expenditure of only £13,850. Thus credit was due to the Mayor, not only for saving the town a sum of £2,300, but for providing the town with a splendid sunken garden for nothing.

By February 1931, three relief schemes were operating in the Borough of Margate. Thirteen men were employed to work on the Sunken Garden, while others worked on the new sewer and cliff defence works at Palm Bay.

During the Second World War, the Garden 'did its bit' for the war effort by giving up 'unnecessary' railings and, according to Historic England. there was a pillbox actually in the Garden with a searchlight battery just outside.

After the Second World War, the Garden continued as a popular visitor attraction until 1995 when government cutbacks led to its neglect.

Nowadays, there is a thriving community project to revive the Garden spearheaded by horticulturalist Peter Hasted with a corps of enthusiastic volunteers under the banner of the Sunken Garden Society. The Bumblebee Conservation Trust (an excellent regular Newsletter – do look them up!) continues to act as a fundamental partner in the revival, aiming to secure the Garden as a haven for bumble bees (of course) and other pollinators alike.

Formed in 2018, Peter and the group have already achieved acclaim from local community and gardening organisations. Awards include a Bronze level from the Kent Wildlife Trust 'Wild About Gardens' scheme, runner-up in Kent Life magazine 'Best Community Gardens' and a Level Five 'Outstanding' by the Royal Horticultural Society/Britain in Bloom 'In Your Neighbourhood' scheme. The Sunken Garden Society has a Facebook page.

As readers will know. 'nature' is increasingly recognised as an integral part of mental and physical 'wellness' and Margate Civic Society is working up an application for an 'Eco Trail' incorporating refurbished coastal information boards together with an enhanced Dane Park 'Experience' – the Sunken Garden forms a useful 'bridge' between shore and inland and the marvels of modern technology mean that any amount of educational material can be downloaded from a prompt – certainly by seven-year olds!

As a footnote, Stephanie 'Cherry Tree' Nsom is pleased to announce that our area's first 'Street Library' has now been installed at Madeira Road, Cliftonville. This is an international idea to promote the reading habit for young and old and to generate a community spirit. Stephanie's earlier experiment at Hither Green proved a great success and she hopes Street Libraries will now proliferate in Margate and the wider Thanet world.


Margate remembers its Fallen

The attendance at this year's service of remembrance was certainly amongst the highest it has been for very many years. Perhaps it was because the occasion marked the 100th anniversary of the Armistice Day commemorations that were first held in London on 11th November 1919 and when the two minutes' silence, as decreed by HM King George V, was observed for the very first time. However, this year's service at Margate was not without mishaps. Firstly at 11 o'clock, part of a recording of a New Year's Eve celebratory broadcast was played over the publicaddress system. That was followed by a much extended period of silence due, seemingly, to confusion as to the precise moment when the two minutes' silence had began that morning. Apart from those mishaps, the service was a huge success and it was pleasing to see the large number of townspeople - particularly young people - in attendance this year. As one who has attended the service every year since returning to live in Margate in 2004, I can vouch for continued growth in the attendance each year. □

Westgate-on-Sea Heritage Centre donates a second memorial bench at St Mildred's Bay to Westgate-on-Sea Town Council

A beautiful bench tribute to the men and women who gave service to the civilian defence forces during Second World War has been officially unveiled in Westgate.

Some 30 people gathered at St Mildred's Bay to witness the Chairman of the Westgate-on-Sea Heritage Centre, Dr Graham Field, present the seat to the Chairman of the Westgate-on-Sea Town Council, Cllr Martyn Pennington, to mark the beginning of the Heritage Centre's commemoration of the eightieth anniversary of the Second World War.

The seat, which is placed close to the memorial to the Westgate Seaplane Base of the First World War and complements the one donated in June this year, is a tribute to the men and women of the civilian defence forces, who are so easily forgotten.

After a brief introduction by Dr Dawn Crouch of the Heritage Centre in which she outlined the services given by the civilians in the dark days of the war, the ribbon was cut by Chris Sandwell.

His mother, Marjorie Clifford, had served with the Auxiliary Fire Service in Westgate at its wartime headquarters in Roxburgh Road, close to where the ceremony was taking place.

He spoke briefly of the stories passed on to him by his mother. Cllr Pennington then accepted the seat on behalf of the Westgate community and the Revd Karen Gooding, Priest-in-Charge of St Saviour's Church, Westgate, led a short act of thanksgiving and remembrance.








Remembering Alf Swain - Margate's Town Sergeant 1918-1937

Alf Swain was undoubtedly a character. The accompanying photograph of him in his uniform probably dates from the mid-1920s when he was around 50 years old. It shows him with his waxed-moustache which, reputedly, was some ten inches wide. Alf Swain was born in 1874 and took over the position of Town Sergeant from John Kevis in 1916 (not in 1918 as shown on the Board in Margate Museum). Alf Swain served as an Orderly at Wanstead VAD Hospital throughout the Great War with the rank of Private, for which he was awarded the British Red Cross Society War Service badge. He also served in the Margate Ambulance Corps during that war and was awarded their War Service badge. His VAD service and his Margate Ambulance Corps service were voluntary as he was employed throughout that time by the Town Council.

Alf Swain served as Town Sergeant for 21 years. His predecessor, John Kevis, had served at Margate's Town Sergeant for 28 years. It is believed that Margate's first Town Sergeant was John Scott who was succeeded by John Kevis around 1888. Although Margate became a Borough in 1857, it did not acquire a mace until 1865. It is not known why the Board in Margate Museum recording the names of the town's Town Sergeant fails to show either John Scott's name or John Kevin's name.

Alf Swain is also featured in this issue of the newsletter in a photograph taken on Armistice Day in 1930 on page 8. Interestingly, he is shown in that

photo carrying the mace on his left shoulder whereas, today, the Macebearer carries the mace on his right shoulder.

As the newspaper cutting from the *Thanet Advertiser and Echo* dated 2nd July 1937 below states, Alf Swain took early retirement in 1937 after 36 years' service with Margate Corporation. He died at Tunbridge Wells in 1943.

Mr. Alfred J. Swain, the Margate Town Sergeant, who has been in the employ of the Corporation for nearly 36 years, will sever that iong association with the focal authority in September.


The question of Mr. Swain's service was considered by the Finance Committee at a meeting on Wednesday and, after some discussion, the committee recommended the Council to grant Mr. Swain a superannuation allowance in excess of the bare allowance to which he would be entitled under the scheme.

The recommendation will be con-

The recommendation will be considered by the Council in Committee this evening.

Mr. Swain has not enjoyed the best of health during the past few years and, for that reason, is retiring before he would be compelled to under the superannuation scheme. If the Council approve the decision of the Finance Committee he will be given leave of absence until September.

Mr. Swain succeeded the late Mr. John Kevis as Town Sergeant in 1918, and, in February next, would have completed 36 years' service with the Corporation, for he acted as assistant to Mr. Kevis for some 14 years. Mr. Kevis was Town Sergeant for about 28 years.



This fine sketch drawn by the late Christopher Alexander in the summer of 1956 was published in the last issue of our Newsletter following a request by his son, Steven, to determine whether any of our members could identify its location. Richard Clements had initially suggested that it might be of the Randolph Hotel in Zion Place.

Following publication of the sketch, other suggestions were received from members of our Society.

Janet & John Robinson put forward the suggestion that it might be the former Hope & Anchor public house that once stood at 173/175 High Street, Margate. By zooming in on the lamp in the photograph, it can be seen that the lamp was very similar - if not identical - to the lamp in the sketch. However, the lamp outside the Hope and Anchor public house can be seen



By zooming in on the lamp shown in the photo below left, it can be seen how similar was the lamp that once hung outside the former Hope and Anchor public house at Margate to the one that once hung outside the Iron Duke Inn at Ramsgate

in the photograph to be above the entrance door on the 'chamfered' corner of the building whereas the lamp in the sketch can be seen to be above the entrance door parallel to the road.

Another suggestion was received from Jane & Dudley Gore that the sketch showed a location in Ramsgate rather than in Margate - the former Iron Duke Inn (previously known as Belle Vue Inn) located at the junction of Belle Vue Road and Plains of Waterloo. It is believed that the ornamental gaslamp was removed from the building some 40 years Sadly, its current ago. whereabouts are unknown.

So, congratulations to Jane & Dudley Gore for correctly locating the depicted scene in Christopher Alexander's fine sketch and a sincere thank you to those who put forward other suggestions. Thanks also to Terry Wheeler for providing the image of the Iron Duke Inn JB

Founded in 1968, the Margate Civic Society is a registered charity and a founder member of Civic Voice. It was also both an affiliated member of the Kent Federation of Amenity Societies and a member of the Kent History Federation but, sadly, both those organisations have recently been wound up.

The Society also vets planning applications and makes known to Thanet District Council any objections to those applications which it considers necessary.

Evening meetings are held monthly between October and May at the Walpole Bay Hotel, Fifth Avenue, Cliftonville. The lectures, mostly digitally illustrated, are interesting and of local interest; they are also varied in their appeal. A Newsletter is published four times a year.
